Course Objectives:

The overall goal of this course is to assist students in obtaining a broader perspective on humanity by means of critically examining life within other cultural contexts and within one's own cultural context. Learning about other life styles and cultures provide various benefits to students, such as:

- (a) learn how to think independently of how society or various social groups *want* you to think.
 - (b) have a better appreciation of the complexities of humanity,
 - (c) become more aware of how arbitrary much of human behavior is,
 - (d) become more sensitive and understanding with others (if warranted),
 - (e) become less egocentric and ethnocentric,
 - (f) realize the availability of behavioral options that were previously unrecognized.

Please note that we will be examining course material in both therapeutic and *non*-therapeutic contexts.

Specific ways by which we will accomplish these objectives include:

- 1) Obtain exposure to the theoretical/descriptive literature written about various cultural groups (nationally and internationally).
- 2) View and discuss in class approximately six short- to medium-length videos on issues related to various cultural groups.
- 3) Have five (5) quizzes or exams.

EXAMS:

There will be five (5) quizzes or exams worth 20 points each (each exam will contain 20 multiple-choice items, worth 1 point each). None of the exams are "cumulative" or "comprehensive." The final exam (Exam 5) is non-comprehensive and is graded as a regular exam.

For each test, you will need to bring a pencil to class and use a scantron ("tan-colored," Form 2052). Academic dishonesty is unacceptable and is dealt with in accordance with UCF regulations (in most cases, students caught cheating will receive a zero on the test and must have a mandatory meeting with the Dean of Academic Affairs).

MAKE-UP EXAMS POLICY:

IMPORTANT: Under most circumstances, there will be no make-up exams. The instructor, at his discretion, may make an exception to this policy when there is a verifiable emergency or debilitating illness. In such a case, the student MUST:

- (1) notify instructor at earliest possible opportunity that test will be (or was) missed (not the next day classes meet, but at the earliest opportunity! Call or e-mail him!)
- (2) provide instructor with evidence of excuse at earliest possible opportunity (a simple note from your parent or a note from a clinic is not sufficient; there must be a documentable emergency).
- (3) Be prepared to take a make-up exam during the Instructor's office hours as soon as you return to UCF.

In the event that your instructor grants a student some sort of accommodation for having missed an exam, student will EITHER take a make-up exam OR the student's grade will be "pro-rated" (that is, no "make-up exam" is given, but grades will be "adjusted" to accommodate the missed exam). The decision to provide a make-up exam OR solely pro-rate the course grade will be made by the Instructor, depending on the circumstances.

NOTE: If you walk into class on an exam day AFTER a student has already turned in the exam and has departed the classroom, you will NOT be permitted to take the exam and, unless you have a documentable emergency, you will receive a zero on that exam.

Attendance: Because of the class size of approximately 200+ students, attendance is strongly encouraged, but is not mandatory. But remember: You are responsible to stay informed of any changes to this tentative course schedule.

IMPORTANT: If you miss a class, you are responsible for getting notes from one or more students who came to class the day you missed and who took notes. Please do not ask me for my notes.

If you missed seeing a video that was shown in class the day you did not attend class, you are responsible for asking one or more students for their notes from the video. Please do not ask me if you may borrow my video(s) because I cannot loan my videos out to students on an individual basis.

Mandatory Paper on "White Shaming"

You must write a 3-page paper based on your reaction to the book, "White Shaming." Although you are free (very free...) to be honest about your reaction to the ideas in the book, you *must defend* (briefly) your views about the ideas—not merely express your positions. Essentially, pick a handful of ideas you encountered in the book and provide your reactions to those ideas (again, not simply saying, "I agree" or "I disagree." Tell me why (briefly) you agree or disagree. These papers must be typed, 12-font, double-spaced. They must be turned in, in class, on Tuesday, March 17th. No late papers will be accepted. This paper is worth (ten) 10 points.

Optional Extra Credit:

If you would like to earn three (3) extra credit points, you may do the following:

Write a three (3)-page paper on any topic related to any cultural group. The paper must be based on information NOT coming from this course (not from my lectures). Paper must be typed, double-spaced, 12 font. Cite your sources in a Reference section at the end.

OR...participate in a UCF approved study (anonymous questionnaires).

NOTE:

** If you elect to write the paper, the Extra Credit Paper is due ON: **Thursday, April 2nd.** (hard copies only, turned in during class time and ONLY on April 2nd)

NOTE: REGARDING papers, **after I** *announce* **to everyone that extra credits have been posted on your MyUCF Grades**, you have 48 hours to bring to my attention if your credits are not appearing. After the 48 hour period, if you have not informed me of missing credit, I will not grant credit (or search for alleged missing write ups).

No late materials will be accepted.
